AWOROSO L/A School Ghana Project Update

The Aworoso Local Authority Junior High School Project in Ghana is a combined effort of the Optimist Club of Central Fairfax and the OTI Region Optimist Club to build a new school. Maxwell Osei Anokye is our Club's leader for this project and also President of the OTI Region Optimist Club of Ghana.

The objective is to resource, build and furnish a new middle school in Aworoso, Ghana. It will have three classrooms with a maximum capacity of 150 students. There will be also be limited spaces for staff/teachers, computers, library, and a place for sick/injured students.

Our Club has sent an application to the Optimist International Foundation to establish an account that will enable donors to make tax-deductible contributions. Project management, construction and everything associated with the completion of the school will be done in Ghana.

Optimism: How It Connects Us By Veronika Owen

The word optimism carries a sense of levity and enlightenment. It's a warmth which comes not from the sun or fire but from within. With a warmth so great, it has the power to ignite the same flame in the hearts of individuals and nations alike.

German philosopher Gottfried Wilhelm Leibniz was an early advocate of what came to be known as optimism, decreeing that God created the "best of all possible worlds." While critiqued by French philosopher Voltaire, the concept took root ("Optimism"), and optimism itself evolved and changed with the people whose hearts it inhabited.

Optimism is not a blindness to the darkness that sometimes descends over the world. It is instead the choice to step into a pool of moonlight — however small — and relish in it, believing that the sun will rise once more and that the songbirds will once more sing in the dawn's rose-gold light. It has been this belief which has united humanity throughout the centuries.

At Valley Forge in the cold, dark winter from 1777 to 1778, George Washington's optimism about the power and perseverance of his troops ("Valley Forge") led him to risk his own life by staying with them even while surrounded by the fear of death and bitter, howling winds. His undying support, strong leadership and belief in his troops led to their victory at Yorktown in 1781 and independence from the British, the most powerful empire in the world ("Valley Forge").

While not all independence movements were fought on the battlefield, optimism remained the essential ingredient to facilitate success. Mahatma Gandhi's belief in non-violence made him a uniting force in India despite religious, linguistics, and cultural differences. Even through fasting in prison, facing threats from facism and the communal violence of the Great Calcutta killings, Gandhi remained optimistic that the peaceful push for independence would outway all violence and bloodshed (Pande, page 2). Gandhi declared, "My optimism rests on my belief in the infinite possibilities of the individual to develop non-violence," (Pande, page 2). His philosophy triumphed, and India gained its independence in 1947 (Gandhi).

Optimism inspires others, and across oceans, Gandhi inspired Martin Luther King, Jr. to believe in non-violence. Through marches, boycotts, and protests, he was a champion of optimism in uniting Americans through non-violence and racial justice. During the 1963 March on Washington, King decreed, "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character," ("Read Martin"). His dedication to the belief that Americans shall not "[drink] from the cup of bitterness and hatred" ("Read Martin") created a movement large enough for the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to pass, outlawing segregation and moving American society into a new era of equality ("Legal Highlight").

Furthermore, optimism is a means to heal what was once broken. After decades of oppression and thousands of deaths in South Africa during Apartheid, Nelson Mandela's administration created the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in which sought testimony from both the National Party and resistance organizations in exchange for potential amnesty (Berger). The ANC government firmly believed in the power of restorative justice to heal the country as opposed to retributive punishment of all involved in the Apartheid regime. The TRC chairman, Desmond Tutu, optimistically saw South Africa as the "Rainbow Nation," having the ability to be a country for all races. The TRC saw thousands of victims give testimony on national television (Berger) which gave South Africans the justice needed to move forward and create a new country in alignment with the ANC's optimistic beliefs.

Optimism is still at the heart of the power to push through when all seems lost, even today. As Russian tanks rolled onto Ukrainian soil in 2022, the world lamented what was thought to be a quick and easy Russian victory. However, President Volodymyr Zelenskyy refused to surrender. His optimism and dedication to Ukrainian sovereignty has inspired a worldwide uproar, uniting against Russian aggression. He always dictates, "we're moving forward," (Koshiw), and his words inspire Ukrainians both domestically and internationally as they continue to breathe and bleed the belief that they will win, that they will prevail.

Lastly, optimism could not persist were it not for the everyday people which stoke the embers and tend to its flame. Optimism retains its power even in the modest lives of everyday people. Whether it be pushing with one's team through a demanding sports practice, encouraging each other after a difficult math test, or comforting a friend or family member in challenging times, optimism is the common link which unites all of us. Whether it be through battle, protest, or everyday life, optimism is the light which leads our way to be the best we can be.
